2023 REVIEW Florida Legislative Priorities



As the voice of the Lakeland Business Community, the Lakeland Chamber of Commerce continually advocates with elected leaders and policy makers to support pro-business legislation. During the 2023 Florida Legislative Session, Lakeland's businesses have identified the following priorities for action.

Here's how the business community fared:

Full funding for the new 6th District Court of Appeals Courthouse <i>in Lakeland.</i> Funded at \$6 million for site selection and design.	~

The Lakeland Chamber supports strengthening our education and workforce systems to close the talent gap and provide Florida with long-term economic prosperity through a highly skilled and educated workforce.

Key Education Priorities

Funding and support for much-needed nursing education programs to recruit highly skilled instructors, build technology-forward facilities and acquire state-of-the-art simulators \$5 million funded for private college and university nursing education program.	✓
Full funding of EASE grants at \$3,500 per student at Independent Colleges and Universities Per student funding set at \$3,500.	✓
Continued funding for VPK programs providing critical early learning and necessary childcare support for working parents Recurring funding levels preserved from 2022.	✓

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Economic Development & Tourism

- ✓ Sustained funding for tourism via Visit Florida and related agencies
- ? Strengthen Florida's economic development and recruitment through continued funding for **Enterprise**Florida (Enterprise Florida eliminated; functions rolled into new Department of Commerce. Chamber monitoring.)
- Support Lakeland Linder International Airport funding through DEO's Job Growth Grant Fund for improvements needed to establish a new Maintenance, Repair and Overhaul facility (Eligible for postsession grant. Chamber monitoring.)

Healthcare

- ✓ Preserve current Medicaid reimbursement rates
- ✓ Fund Graduate Medical Education at Lakeland Regional Health to support Polk County's growing population

Transportation, Traffic & Safety

- ✓ Oppose legislation that would eliminate the ability to use Rectangular Rapid Flashing beacons at midblock pedestrian crossings
- ✓ Fund expansion of the I-4 corridor including vehicular and multimodal improvements through and adjacent to Polk County
- ✓ Streamline funding for local "shovel-ready" projects designed to ease traffic in Florida's fastest-growing communities

During the 2023 Legislative Session, the Chamber supported the following education priorities from Polk County institutions:

Polk County Public Schools

- Eliminate 1-year moratorium for instructors to **return to the classroom** and still receive FRS benefits.
- Modify the teacher salary increase allocation by creating a funding component to address salary compression.
- Modify the statute to extend temporary certificates to 5 years for all recipients.

Florida Polytechnic University

- \$3.6 million to enhance ongoing efforts to establish university as an Engineering School of Distinction that focuses on Florida's workforce.
- \$13 million for a Student Achievement
 Center to support 1,600+ students.

Warner University

 Support \$3.5 million appropriation for sewer service that serves Warner and this portion of Polk County.

Polk State College

- Support operational funding that will expand faculty and space in Winter Haven and/or Haines City
- Support \$12 million for renovation funds for Building I on the Lakeland campus for modernization and a student center, labs, and more classrooms

Webber University

✓ Support funding of \$500,000 for construction of a Health Sciences Building.

Keiser University

Support Criminal Justice/Cybersecurity with a grant from the Joint Legislative Budget Commission to purchase a state-ofthe-art virtual simulation training system.
